



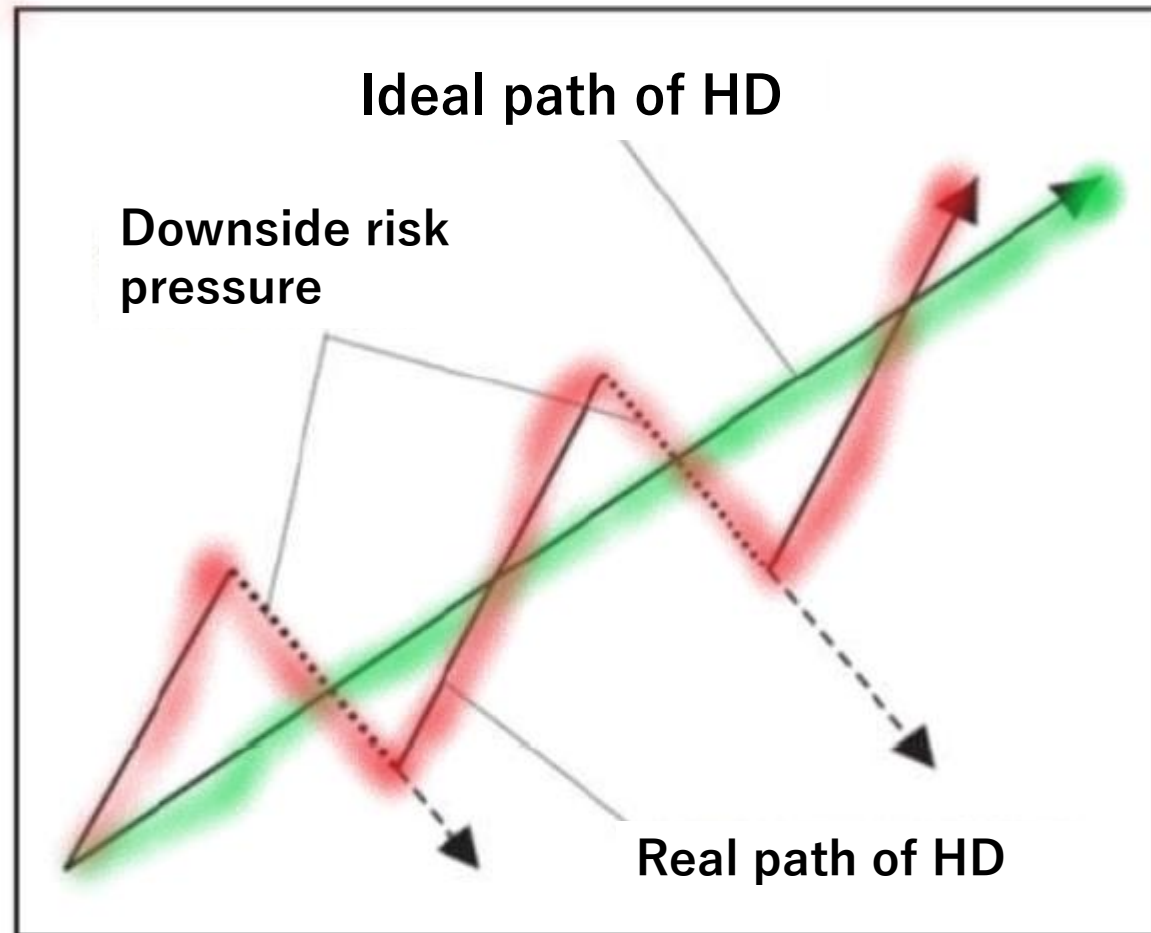

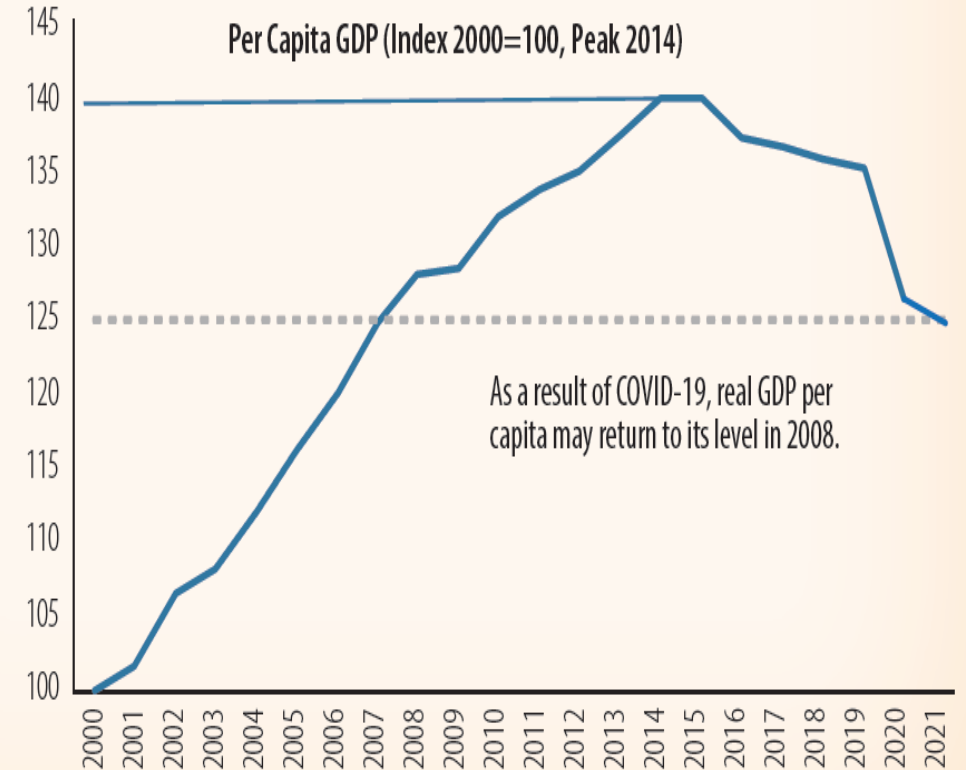
Human development(HD) and Human security(HS)



GDP per capita reversed to the 10 year back level

The slow recovery projected in 2021 implies that at the end of 2021, the region's real GDP per capita would be back to its level in 2008.

FIGURE 1.52: Real GDP per Capita, 2000–21

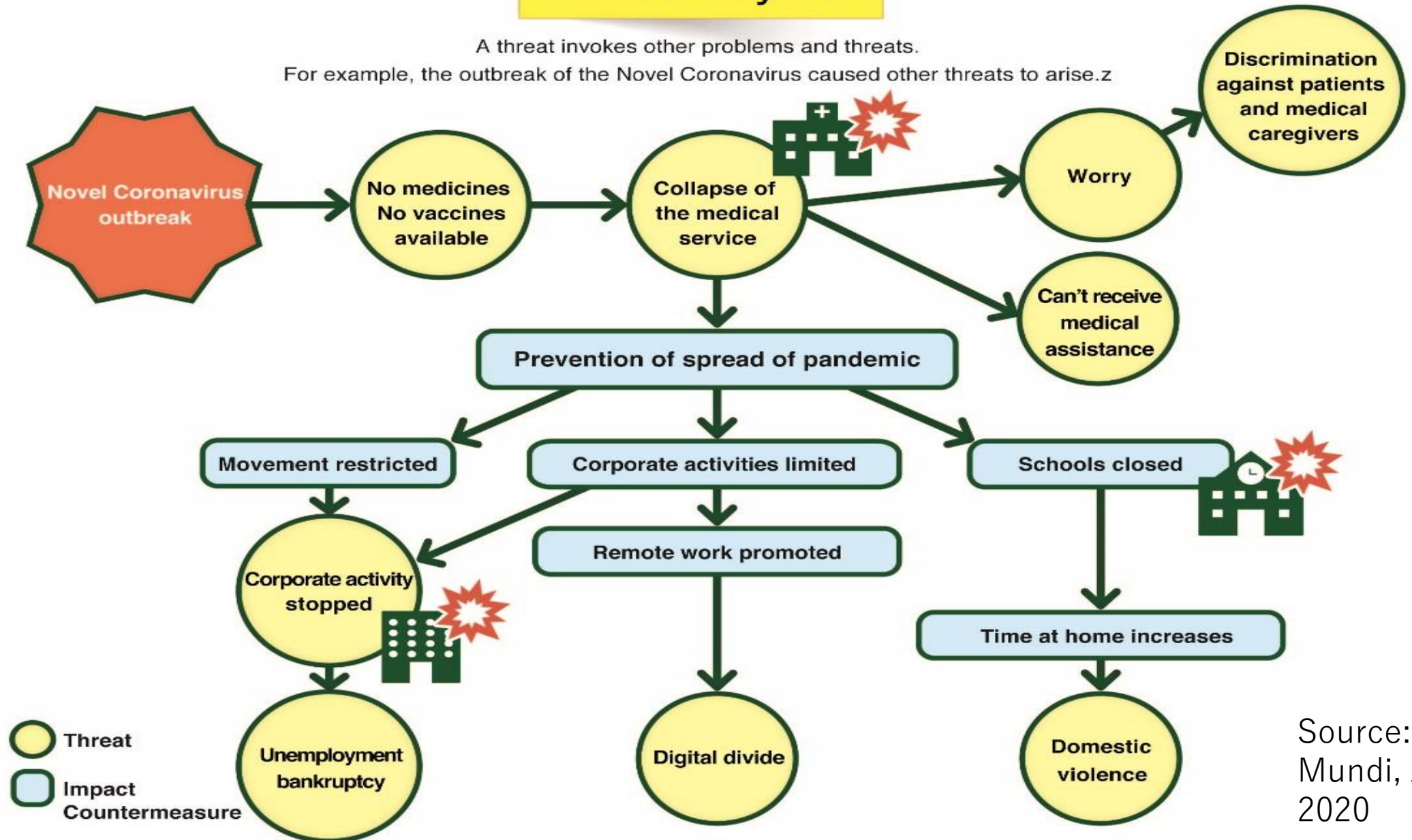

Three Transformations to promote HS

1. Creating shared value (CSV) transformation
2. Digital transformation (DX)
3. Global governance transformation

Common points

- Protecting people's lives, livelihoods, and dignity from various threats
- Bottom-up initiatives by businesses and NGOs
- Network-based, transcending national and sectoral boundaries

Creating shared value (CSV) transformation

- The concept of “Creating Shared Values (CSV)” :
Companies create not only economic value (profit, etc.) but also social value to meet social needs. (Porter and Kramer 2011)
- The number of companies seeking to pursue both economic profit and social contributions has been steadily increasing worldwide. This trend has been accelerated by climate change and the COVID-19.
- Schemes include i) Sustainable Finance, ii) Business and Human Rights, iii) Social Business.

Digital transformation (DX)

- The global COVID-19 pandemic has triggered a dramatic shift in the digitization of the economy and society.
- While leapfrogging is a well-known way to jump ahead, there are also many advanced examples in African countries, such as Kenya's M-PESA.
- DX can contribute significantly to human security.
- But we need to look beyond the downsides of DX, such as digital divide, cyber-attacks, fake news. They are emerging human insecurity.

Global governance transformation

- Global governance based on multilateral cooperation has been weakened by geopolitical conflicts and growing unilateralism and is further challenged by the COVID-19 pandemic.
- For “Build Back Better” (BBB) in a post-COVID-19 world, civil society needs to strengthen bottom-up, cross-border and cross-sectoral networks to prepare for various threats, including new infectious diseases.
- This could help to build a more resilient global governance that reduces the influence of global politics, thereby leading to human security in practice.
