



JICA-IDB collaboration for clean cities: Examples

Country	Examples
Panama	Panama City and Bay Sanitation Project. The program transformed the city and the bay, and the program continues to expand under the leadership of the Panama's Ministry of Health (MINSA).
Costa Rica	Water and Sanitation Program. The Program has been a pioneering program for sanitation, in a country that now is famed for its commitment to sustainable development, based on the country's natural capital.
Peru	A series of solid waste management programs in the country's priority areas. Based on these programs, the country can move towards a recycling-oriented society and a low-carbon society for sustainable development.
Paraguay	Potable Water and Sanitation Project for the Metropolitan Area of Ciudad del Este. The project aims to contribute to the preservation of the quality of water resources in the Paraná River and Guaraní Aquifer System, and to improve the quality of life of the population.
