This information pertains to one of the JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Programs (Group & Region Focus) of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) implemented as part of the Official Development Assistance of the Government of Japan based on bilateral agreement between both Governments.

JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Program (KCCP)

The Japanese Cabinet released the Development Cooperation Charter in February 2015, which stated, *"In its development cooperation, Japan has maintained the spirit of jointly creating things that suit partner countries while respecting ownership, intentions and intrinsic characteristics of the country concerned based on a field-oriented approach through dialogue and collaboration. It has also maintained the approach of building reciprocal relationships with developing countries in which both sides learn from each other and grow and develop together." JICA believes that this 'Knowledge Co-Creation Program' will serve as a foundation of mutual learning process.*

I. Concept

Background

Recently, the role of forests in terms of climate change has been highlighted worldwide. The forestry sector including deforestation accounts for 17.4 percent of total CO2 emissions, which is more than the share of total emissions from the transport sector. According to FAO (Food and Agriculture Organization) statistics, there was a 178 million hectares forest net loss between 1990 and 2020, and to tackle this global deforestation issue, international communities have been concentrating every effort. Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and Forest Degradation-plus (REDD+) is one of such efforts. For instance, the twenty-first session of the Conference of the Parties (COP21) to UNFCCC embraced the Paris Agreement referring to promotion of REDD+, and many countries submitted Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) which include the forest and land sector as one of the key components for the reduction of CO2 emission. In accordance with the increase of the global concern about REDD+, both developing countries and international partners strengthen their efforts for REDD+, and the situations surrounding REDD+ are rapidly changing. It has become significantly important for developing countries to understand international discussions of readiness, implementation, result-based payment stages of REDD+ as well as its progress in their own countries to grasp the gap between its situation and requirements of international frameworks, and make effective strategies for REDD+.

For what?

In order to promote "Reduced Emissions from Deforestation and Forest Degradation (REDD+)" in developing countries, this program aims at enhancing the capacity of government executives or mid-level officials to plan and implement policies based on their own countries' situations by taking the international framework and requirements into consideration.

For whom?

Executive officers or mid-level officials of national / local governments who are engaged in policymaking, institutional arrangement and implementation of REDD+.

How?

Programs of this course are divided into 3 modules as below. Participants will learn how they can promote REDD+ implementation in their countries through various lectures, discussions among participants and individual consultation with Japanese experts etc.

[Module Output 2] Understanding mechanisms of international climate funds [Module Output 3] Analyzing the current situation of participants' countries

- To access to REDD+ related funds to implement the national REDD+ strategy.

1. Expectations to the Applying Organizations

(1)This program is designed primarily for organizations that intend to address specific issues or problems identified in their operations. Applying organizations are expected to use the program for those specific purposes.

(2)In this connection, applying organizations are expected to nominate the most qualified candidates to address the issues or problems, carefully referring to the qualifications described in section III-2 below.

(3)Applying organizations are also expected to be prepared to make use of knowledge acquired by the nominees for the purpose mentioned.

2. Nominee Qualifications

Applying organizations are expected to select nominees who meet the following qualifications.

(1) Essential Qualifications

1) Current Duties: to achieve the output previously described, the following criteria is especially important: be an executive or mid-level official of national or local government who is currently /will be playing a major role in REDD+ policy making and implementation.

2) Nomination: be nominated by their government in accordance with the procedures mentioned in 4. "Procedure for Application and Selection" below.

3) Age: Preferably over 35 years and under 59 years of age.

4) Language: **have sufficient command of English**. (During the course program, participants are requested to give presentations and actively participate in discussions. Communication and presentation skills in English are essentially important.)

5) Health: be in good health, both physically and mentally, to complete the program.

(2) Recommended Qualifications

Gender Consideration: JICA promotes gender equality. Women are encouraged to apply for the program.

3. Required Documents for Application

- (1) Application Form: The Application Form is available at the JICA overseas office (or the Embassy of Japan)
- (2) Country Report: Applicants should submit "Country Report" together with the Application Form. It will be used as a reference for selection of participants, individual consultation with Japanese experts, comparative studies and group discussion. The instructions of the Country Report are shown in the ANNEX 1: "Information on Country Report".

- (3) Organization Chart: Applicants are requested to submit the Organization Chart together with the Application Form to show an agency(s) responsible for REDD+ in their country. Please clearly indicate the applicant's position on the chart. This chart is used as a reference upon selection of participants.
- (4) Questionnaire (Internet learning environment): to be submitted with the Application Form. Please use the form, ANNEX 2.

4. Procedures for Application and Selection

(1) Submission of the Application Documents

Deadline for applications: **Please confirm the local deadline with the JICA overseas office (or the Embassy of Japan).**All required material must arrive at **JICA Tokyo Center in Japan** <u>by August 12, 2021)</u>

[Note] Please inform JICA overseas office the details of your internet environment by submitting the questionnaire referred to in 3(4) above and your preferred place to take the program (both Online and On Demand).

(2) Selection

Primary screening is conducted at the JICA overseas office (or the Embassy of Japan) after receiving official documents from your government. JICA Tokyo Center will consult with concerned organizations in Japan in the process of final selection. Applying organizations with the best intentions to utilize the opportunity will be highly valued. The Government of Japan will examine applicants who belong to the military or other military-related organizations and/or who are enlisted in the military, taking into consideration of their duties, positions in the organization and other relevant information in a comprehensive manner to be consistent with the Development Cooperation Charter of Japan.

(3) Notice of Acceptance

The JICA overseas office (or the Embassy of Japan) will notify the results **August 23. 2021** at the latest.

For Your Reference

JICA and Capacity Development

Technical cooperation is people-to-people cooperation that supports partner countries in enhancing their comprehensive capacities to address development challenges by their own efforts. Instead of applying Japanese technology per se to partner countries, JICA's technical cooperation provides solutions that best fit their needs by working with people living there. In the process, consideration is given to factors such as their regional characteristics, historical background, and languages. JICA does not limit its technical cooperation to human resources development; it offers multi-tiered assistance that also involves organizational strengthening, policy formulation, and institution building.

Implementation methods of JICA's technical cooperation can be divided into two approaches. One is overseas cooperation by dispatching experts and volunteers in various development sectors to partner countries; the other is domestic cooperation by inviting participants from developing countries to Japan. The latter method is the Knowledge Co-Creation Program, formerly called Training Program, and it is one of the core programs carried out in Japan. By inviting officials from partner countries and with cooperation from domestic partners, the Knowledge Co-Creation Program provides technical knowledge and practical solutions for development issues in participating countries.

The Knowledge Co-Creation Program (Group & Region Focus) has long occupied an important place in JICA operations. About 400 pre-organized course cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructure, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, rural development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs is being customized by the different target organizations to address the specific needs, such as policy-making organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and academic institutions. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar developmental challenges.

Japanese Development Experience

Japan, as the first non-Western nation to become a developed country, built itself into a country that is free, peaceful, prosperous and democratic while preserving its tradition. Japan will serve as one of the best examples for our partner countries to follow in their own development.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled Japan to become what it is today has emanated from a process of adoption and adaptation, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the success stories.

Through Japan's progressive adaptation and application of systems, methods and technologies from the West in a way that is suited to its own circumstances, Japan has developed a storehouse of knowledge not found elsewhere from unique systems of organization, administration and personnel management to such social systems as the livelihood improvement approach and governmental organization.
