This information pertains to one of the JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Programs (Group & Region Focus) of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) implemented as part of the Official Development Assistance of the Government of Japan based on bilateral agreement between both Governments.

JICA Knowledge Co-Creation Program (KCCP)

The Japanese Cabinet released the Development Cooperation Charter in February 2015, which stated, *“In its development cooperation, Japan has maintained the spirit of jointly creating things that suit partner countries while respecting ownership, intentions and intrinsic characteristics of the country concerned based on a field-oriented approach through dialogue and collaboration. It has also maintained the approach of building reciprocal relationships with developing countries in which both sides learn from each other and grow and develop together.”* JICA believes that this ‘Knowledge Co-Creation Program’ will serve as a foundation of mutual learning process.

I. Concept

Background

Many cities in developing countries are facing a variety of urban problems as cities grow rapidly, which are caused by concentration of the population into urban areas. The well-planned expansion as well as redevelopment of urban areas is required.

In Japan the high economic growth from late 1950s to early 70s caused rapid growth of cities with various kinds of urban problems. To accommodate soaring urban population and urban functions and address the urban problems, Japan had developed planned new urban areas in the periphery of large cities. These developments were usually implemented with the development of public transportation, which established Japanese type of TOD (Transit Oriented Development).

On the other hand, lots of densely populated residential areas with wooden low-rise buildings remained in city centers. They are vulnerable to disasters, especially earthquakes and fires. Japan also have been committed to redevelopment of these areas.

For what?

This program aims to find out appropriate approaches to solutions to urban problems and issues caused by rapid growth of cities in the participating countries through Japanese and international experiences and practices regarding urban development.

The program focuses on two themes of urban development, which are TOD and redevelopment of densely populated areas in city centers. With the objective of newly developing urban areas or redeveloping existing inefficient urban areas, this program will introduce a comprehensive approach to urban development, including methods such as land readjustment and urban redevelopment methods to overcome various urban problems.

For whom?

This program is offered to central and local government officials currently in charge of urban planning and urban development projects.

How?

This program is carried out totally online and organized by JICA Tokyo Center. Participants will have opportunity for online lectures, group discussions, planning practices, and individual presentation.

10. Follow-up Program

If highly-feasible and well-designed proposals are presented at the last session of the program, the proposals could be followed-up for further development. Specifically, for example, Japanese professors or consultants are dispatched to the country of the proposal on a short-term basis to carry the proposal forward or JICA provides the participant's organization with necessary support to hold the workshops or seminars in order to improve the proposal further.

NOTE: The follow-up program is selectively done to the proposals.

III. Eligibility and Procedures

1. Expectations to the Applying Organizations

- (1) This program is designed primarily for organizations that intend to address specific issues or problems identified in their operation. Applying organizations are expected to use the program for those specific purposes.
- (2) This program is enriched with contents and facilitation schemes specially developed in collaboration with relevant prominent organizations in Japan. These special features enable the program to meet specific requirements of applying organizations and effectively facilitate them toward solutions for the issues and problems.

2. Nominee Qualifications

Applying organizations are expected to select nominees who meet the following qualifications.

(1) Essential Qualifications

- 1) Educational Background: have a university degree or equivalent
- 2) Experience in the Relevant Field: have more than 10 years of professional experiences in urban development and/or urban planning
- 3) Age: between the ages of twenty-five (35) and fifty (50) years in principle
- 4) Language Proficiency: a high level of English language ability in speaking and writing
- 5) Health: must be in good health to participate in the program

(2) Recommended Qualifications

- 1) Decision making: Preferably a person who is at the decision-making level regarding urban development policies.
- 2) Gender Consideration: JICA promotes gender equality. Women are encouraged to apply for the program.

(3) Technical Requirements

Please prepare the learning environment where you can use software like Zoom Client for Meeting, Word, Excel, PowerPoint, YouTube and etc., without problem. If you need any assistance for preparation of the environment, please consult with JICA overseas office

(2) Selection

Primary screening is conducted at the JICA overseas office (or the embassy of Japan) after receiving official documents from your government. JICA Tokyo Center will consult with concerned organizations in Japan in the process of final selection. Applying organizations with the best intentions to utilize the opportunity will be highly valued.

The Government of Japan will examine applicants who belong to the military or other military-related organizations and/or who are enlisted in the military, taking into consideration of their duties, positions in the organization and other relevant information in a comprehensive manner to be consistent with the Development Cooperation Charter of Japan.

(3) Notice of Acceptance

The JICA overseas office (or the Embassy of Japan) will notify the results **not later than December 24, 2021.**

Accepted candidates are required to prepare a Country Report (See ***V. Other Information 2 (1).***)

6. Conditions for Participation

V. Other Information

1. Distribution of Material for Preliminary Phase

The material (references and videos) for the preliminary study will be shared after the issuance of acceptance notice to the selected participants through the dedicated website.

2. Preparation of the Reports

Participants are required to make specific proposals to solve issues/problems regarding city planning to be handled by the participants or their organizations. To this end, participants are requested to prepare reports in two steps.

(1) The first step: Country Report (Annex 2)

The Country Report will describe overview of urban issues/problems mainly caused by rapid growth of cities in your cities/country. Accepted participants are required to prepare the Country Report (detailed information is provided in the Annex 2 "Country Report").

The Country Report should be uploaded to the designated dedicated web-platform not later than **January 14th (Friday), 2022.**

At the beginning of this program, participants will deliver a presentation of their Country Reports in about 10 minutes. Participants are requested to prepare visual material such as MS Power Point for the presentation.

(2) The second step: Proposal Report

Participants are expected to deliver a presentation about the proposal to improve urban development matters in about 20 minutes. The proposal should be feasible to solve the urban issues/problems. The instruction of the proposal report will be provided in the core phase. As written in ***II. Description 10 Follow-up Program***, if highly feasible and excellent proposals are presented, the proposals could be followed-up to further develop them.

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For Your Reference

JICA and Capacity Development

Technical cooperation is people-to-people cooperation that supports partner countries in enhancing their comprehensive capacities to address development challenges by their own efforts. Instead of applying Japanese technology per se to partner countries, JICA's technical cooperation provides solutions that best fit their needs by working with people living there. In the process, consideration is given to factors such as their regional characteristics, historical background, and languages. JICA does not limit its technical cooperation to human resources development; it offers multi-tiered assistance that also involves organizational strengthening, policy formulation, and institution building.

Implementation methods of JICA's technical cooperation can be divided into two approaches. One is overseas cooperation by dispatching experts and volunteers in various development sectors to partner countries; the other is domestic cooperation by inviting participants from developing countries to Japan. The latter method is the Knowledge Co-Creation Program, formerly called Training Program, and it is one of the core programs carried out in Japan. By inviting officials from partner countries and with cooperation from domestic partners, the Knowledge Co-Creation Program provides technical knowledge and practical solutions for development issues in participating countries.

The Knowledge Co-Creation Program (Group & Region Focus) has long occupied an important place in JICA operations. About 400 pre-organized courses cover a wide range of professional fields, ranging from education, health, infrastructure, energy, trade and finance, to agriculture, rural development, gender mainstreaming, and environmental protection. A variety of programs is being customized by the different target organizations to address the specific needs, such as policy-making organizations, service provision organizations, as well as research and academic institutions. Some programs are organized to target a certain group of countries with similar developmental challenges.

Japanese Development Experience

Japan, as the first non-Western nation to become a developed country, built itself into a country that is free, peaceful, prosperous and democratic while preserving its tradition. Japan will serve as one of the best examples for our partner countries to follow in their own development.

From engineering technology to production management methods, most of the know-how that has enabled Japan to become what it is today has emanated from a process of adoption and adaptation, of course, has been accompanied by countless failures and errors behind the success stories.

Through Japan's progressive adaptation and application of systems, methods and technologies from the West in a way that is suited to its own circumstances, Japan has

developed a storehouse of knowledge not found elsewhere from unique systems of organization, administration and personnel management to such social systems as the livelihood improvement approach and governmental organization. It is not easy to apply such experiences to other countries where the circumstances differ, but the experiences can provide ideas and clues useful when devising measures to solve problems.

JICA, therefore, would like to invite as many leaders of partner countries as possible to come and visit us, to mingle with the Japanese people, and witness the advantages as well as the disadvantages of Japanese systems, so that integration of their findings might help them reach their developmental objectives.
