Also, it is my great expectation that participants will play a significant role as a leader in the respective fields after their return, fostering a long-lasting bilateral relationship between each respective country and Japan.



# Overview – JICA Development Studies Program


JICA-DSP invites future leaders from partner countries to Japan and offers them the opportunity to learn about Japan’s modernization and development experiences. JICA-DSP is being carried out by JICA as part of official development assistance (ODA) by the government of Japan. JICA-DSP is offered for international scholars accepted as the participants of JICA’s Human Resource Development Project, hereinafter referred to as “JICA scholars,” who are enrolled in a degree program at a Japanese university.

JICA-DSP consists of two components, **Understanding the Japanese Development Experience** and **Development Studies Programs Offered by Various Universities**.

### Understanding the Japanese Development Experience

JICA and partner universities utilize a combination of a classroom program, online lecture series, and a local program to enable all JICA scholars to deeply understand Japanese development experiences by learning its local history and development.

### Development Studies Programs Offered by Various Universities

These programs have been established among the graduate degree courses of the universities taking part in the JICA-DSP. These encompass a broad range of fields that include politics and law, economics and finance, social development, science and technology, and innovation.



## JICA Chair (JICA Program for Japanese Studies)

To expand the opportunities of Japanese studies in partner countries, JICA has started the “JICA Chair (JICA Program for Japanese studies)” in collaboration with leading universities in partner countries. JICA Chair’s activities include short intensive lectures conducted by lecturers, joint research activities, and research and education opportunities provided for young researchers in Japan.

JICA and its partner organizations also provide reference materials for Japanese studies and research and education opportunities to faculty members of universities who wish to establish or strengthen courses or programs of Japanese studies.





The National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies (GRIPS) contributes to the JICA-DSP through its leadership program, Global Governance Program (G-Cube).

The aim of G-Cube is to foster “leaders of leaders”—individuals who can bring together the leaders of each field and channel their knowledge into solving major world issues. To that end, leaders of leaders use big-picture thinking to coordinate and reconcile disparate values and interests.

In Japan, university courses that are delivered in English tend to rely on Western textbooks and Western case studies. Without being nationalistic, I believe that such courses should try to use more Japanese case studies to develop universal, generalizable theories. This approach would help advance the level of research.

In conjunction with JICA-DSP, the International University of Japan (IUJ) has launched the Japan-Global Development Program (JGDP). The JGDP is a novel post-graduate program that spans and combines the resources of multiple graduate schools.

Through the JGDP, attendees will learn about Japan's experience in national development. They will also develop theoretical frameworks for explaining how and why Japan's national development path differed from that of Western nations. The ultimate aim of JGDP is to develop such theoretical perspectives and share them with a global audience. Scholars attending the program will take an inductive case-study approach, examining specific historical cases and deriving a general theory from them, which they will share with the worldwide academic community. It is my hope that these theories will be extrapolated and applied to cases around the world.
