## Program Overview (Development Studies Programs Offered by Various Universities)

Features of	Master of Public Management and Administration Course (hereinafter referred to as
School	MPMA) is a new program launched in September 2016. It is designed particularly for
	mid-career public officers to nurture and develop their capacities to review, formulate,
	manage, and evaluate policies and programs effectively to become leaders in the
	governmental and the non-governmental sectors. Our course is managed by the
	Graduate School of Business, which has been offering a successful English-medium
	master's program (Master of International Business, MIB) since 2011. Our course
	consists of two components to fulfill the master's degree requirement: coursework and
	thesis writing.
Program Outline	MPMA offers the two-year graduate-level education that develops the mid-career
	government officials who plan to study theories and quantitative analytical skills. We
	train competent, enthusiastic and responsible leaders in the government sectors, who
	can formulate development plans and policies, under the following principle teaching
	policy. We require our student to complete coursework and a master's thesis to fulfil the
	graduation requirement. More detailed outline is as follows:
	1. In the first year, our students are required to take at least five courses from the
	following eight courses: Mathematics, Statistics, Econometrics, Research
	Methodology, Microeconomics, Public Management, Public Administration and
	Public Finance and Budgeting. By taking these courses, the students can acquire
	fundamental knowledge in Public Management and Economics as well as data
	analytical skills. We also offer workshops on the widely used statistical software
	Stata regularly.
	2. In the second year, our students will take elective courses in the areas of public
	management, economics and business management. In these courses, they will
	acquire advanced knowledge and analytical skills necessary to analyze policy
	issues and formulate, implement and evaluate development policies and programs.
	We suggest the students pursing this development issue to take several courses,
	such as Local Government and Public Services, Public Policy, Environmental
	Economics, Regional Economics, and Development Economics, jointly with the
	courses for quantitative analysis courses, Development Planning and Advanced
	Econometrics.

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	3. In the elective course, the students can take courses such as Human Resource
	Management, Corporate Finance, and Marketing in the field of Business from MIB
	course, another course of our graduate school. These courses equip the students
	with the insights from the private sector. We believe that the students could more
	effectively communicate with, monitor, and learn from the private sector upon
	returning to their organizations after graduation. Besides, we invite the practitioners
	from the public sectors to deliver the lectures of Project Cycle Management and
	Public Private Partnership.
	4. Working on the master's thesis is one of the core components of our curriculum.
	The students work closely with their supervisor and advisor from the early to the
	final phases in their research work. Through the supervision, student can
	acknowledge research plan, literature review, academic presentation, and academic
	writing and obtain basic skills necessary for academic research (analytical methods
	and result interpretation). Our faculty members also encourage the students to
	publish their master's theses in peer-reviewed academic journals after graduation.
Outline of	"Development Planning"
Subjects	This course introduces several fundamental quantitative techniques and
	econometric models, essential for development planning and policy analysis in
	developing as well as developed economies. Topics covered in this course
	include the development planning process in Japan, the simple aggregate
	growth models, the multi-sector model (national and regional input-output
	models), non-parametric frontier analysis model (Data Envelopment Analysis).
	"Japanese Economy"
	This course presents a picture of how theory in economics relates to the
	problems, reviewing its development process in Japan, fundamental policy
	issues, and contemporary business environment in Japan. The ultimate goal of
	this course is to expand the student's analytical frameworks for the master's
	thesis.
