Background

Japan's unique and considerable experiences in development

Japan is the first country that has modernized into an independent, democratic, prosperous, and peace-loving nation based on the rule of law, without losing much of its tradition and identity from a non-Western background. Therefore, Japan could serve as one of the best examples for developing countries to follow in their own development.

Japan was defeated in 1945 but recovered very quickly. Furthermore, Japan has extensive experience in development cooperation through official development assistance (ODA), which

contributed to remarkable socio-economic progress in recipient countries, especially in Asia.

By sharing Japan's experiences and lessons learned through its modernization, post-war recovery, and development cooperation, Japan can lead development studies globally and thereby contribute to sustainable development.

Objectives

Developing future leaders

- JICA launched the "JICA Development Studies Program (JICA-DSP)" in 2018, in cooperation with various universities in Japan.
- This program offers future leaders of developing countries an opportunity to study not only their specialized academic fields at Japanese graduate schools but also learn about Japan's modernization and development cooperation experiences in light of its historical and cultural background.



In order to expand the opportunities to learn about Japan's experience, JICA now started the "JICA Chair (JICA Program for Japanese Studies)" in collaboration with leading universities in partner countries.



The JICA Chair's activities are of the following two types, and partner countries can select or combine relevant tools based on their needs and the availability of resources:

JICA Chair of Japanese Studies

To establish the JICA Chair of Japanese Studies or strengthen existing research and education programs in leading universities in partner countries:

- Delivering short intensive lectures
- Conducting joint research activities
- Providing research and education opportunities in Japan for young researchers (for academic degrees or on sabbatical)
- Promoting understanding of Japanese culture and language through collaboration with Japan Overseas Cooperation Volunteers and other programs

Japanese Modernization Lecture Series

JICA, with the Open University of Japan, produced the Japanese Modernization Lecture Series program. It covers Japan's modernization experiences from the closing years of the Edo period (1603–1867) to the Meiji period (1868–1912) and thereafter, as well as the nation's political history and development experience after World War II.

JICA Chair's Presence in Partner Countries



Bolivia

In Bolivia, the JICA Chair Programs are offered as diploma courses at universities and graduate schools. Universidad Autónoma Gabriel René Moreno (UAGRM), Bolivia's largest national university, which has continued to implement the JICA Chair, has established a diploma course in Japanese-style business management at its Graduate School of Business Administration and a new diploma course for students of the Faculty of Agriculture. With the cooperation of various sectors in Japan that have a wealth of experience and broad knowledge, we are passing on Japan's development experience to the young people who will be future leaders of Bolivia.

Mongolia

In Mongolia, which has close ties to Japan, the JICA Chair works to further strengthen this network. The National University of Mongolia, the highest academic institution in Mongolia, has established a graduate school of Japanese language and Japanese studies and is closely connected to Japan and the JICA. In 2022, on the 50th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations between Japan and Mongolia, a series of JICA Chair courses were held, gradually gaining recognition, becoming a credit course in 2023. This program fosters talents that can act as bridges between Mongolia and Japan.

Through the JICA Chair Program, not only the students but I too learnt that the factors that made Japan's modernization successful require the development of infrastructure and the cultivation of human resources.
