



JICA Development Studies Program (JICA-DSP)

Various universities, in collaboration with JICA, have established JICA-DSP among the graduate school degree courses they offer. JICA-DSP consists of class subjects pertaining to the development experience of modern Japan (including the experience of Japan's own development and of its cooperation with other countries through ODA). This program offers JICA scholars a chance to deepen their understanding of Japan's development experience in the respective academic fields.

Graduate School of Humanities and Social Sciences

International Peace and Co-existence Program – This is a cross-disciplinary program that enhances critical thinking skills in the academic disciplines of Peace Studies, Cultural Anthropology, International Relations, Law, Ethics, and Area Studies under the common key concept of "Peace and Co-existence."

International Economic Development Program – This program provides a systematic curriculum to cultivate abilities for identifying/targeting issues, applied analysis, policy proposals that can link advanced social science methods to practical problem solving. This program also offers learning and training opportunities to develop professional communication skills and leadership in problem solving.

International Education Development Program – This program offers a wide range of courses and seminars of education research in Asia and African regions, in pursuit of its ultimate goal of realizing quality lifelong learning society and sustainable educational development in developing countries.

Graduate School of Advanced Science and Engineering

Transdisciplinary Science and Engineering Program – This program is a multi- and inter-disciplinary diploma program that develops researchers and educators who possess a human-oriented point of view and have acquired research abilities, expertise, professional skills, and cross-disciplinary points of view. Areas of core expertise include the natural environment, natural disasters, integrated physics, information systems, media, and development technology.

COURSE SUBJECTS

Japanese Experience of Social Development-Economy, Infrastructure, and Peace (Required) Japanese Experience of Human Development-Culture, Education, and Health (Required)

- Discussion on the UN Sustainable Development Goals under the guiding principles of Hiroshima University "Pursuit of Peace" and the long-term vision "Splendor Plan 2017."
- Japanese experience of development, including newer issues of rapid aging and depopulation

- Economic development and environmental conservation, and countermeasures for natural hazards
- Practical knowledge to contribute towards environmentally sustainable development in developing countries by understanding Japanese development experiences
- Historical transitions in Japan's development and environmental problems

Peace and Co-existence A & B (Elective)

• Basic knowledge and training for critical thinking about peace-related issues Emphasis on Japanese experiences of diplomacy, security, peace, and development

History of Japanese Educational Development (Elective)

- Overall view of the current Japanese education system and policies
- Review of pre- and post-war policies from different levels of education
