13. Features and Curriculum of Program	 In order to open up new areas of research in global environmental studies that are substantially different from those of the traditional sciences, professors of the Graduate School promote university-wide research projects with the intensive collaboration of researchers from different areas. The Graduate School promotes and actively participates in these research projects. MASTER'S PROGRAM IN ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT (1) Educational Objectives The program aims to train/foster specialists who will have in-depth knowledge of global and regional environments and the practical skills necessary to solve environmental problems, and who are instilled with an international perspective. (2) Completion Requirements Completion requirements for the Master's Program assume registration in the course for 2 years or more, having earned at least 30 credits in major subjects and the passing of the examination and review of the Master's thesis held by the graduate school. However, in the case of students who have achieved remarkable research accomplishments, a shortening of the time period mentioned above may be possible in accordance with relevant provisions. (3) Criteria for Review and Evaluation of the Master's Thesis A thesis submitted for evaluation in the Master's program in Environmental Management should reflect the educational objectives of the program, should make a contribution to solving global or regional environmental problems, and will be evaluated according to theoretica. It is recommended that the thesis reflects the results of work carried out during an internship. The contents may be of a practical nature, as well as of a fundamental or theoretical nature. (4) Required Credits Following credits must be acquired: S credits (4 classes) in the Basics in Global Environmental Studies as compulsory, more than 5 credits from the Lecture in Environmental Management as elective, more than 1 credit from
