	origins back to Yamaguchi Kodo, a private school, founded by Ueda Hoyo, a feudal		
	clansman of Choshu Province in the late Edo Period (1815). In 1949 it was reorganized		
	to become a national university consisting of five faculties. Throughout the years the		
	university has expanded into a comprehensive university which boasts nine faculties		
	and eight graduate schools. The year 2015 marked the 200th anniversary of the		
	establishment of Yamaguchi Kodo.

Strengthening International Student Support

The following goals surrounding the acceptance of international students have been established as part of our university's medium term objectives:

- · To enhance guidance for international students
- To provide support systems involving the local community and municipality to secure provision of reasonably priced, good quality accommodation
- · Appointing professors to guide international students.
- To strengthen follow up after providing academic and daily life support to ensure the main objective of supporting international students is achieved

Research Guidance Policy

The research guidance policy of the Public Administration Course at the Graduate School of Economics is as follows:

- 1) A research supervisor for each student is appointed beforehand depending on the research proposal, so that students may start to work immediately after their arrival. Thesis instruction is conducted in a multidisciplinary manner by appointing one main supervisor and two sub-supervisors for each student. The main supervisor guides the students throughout the years, providing practical, face-to-face research advice.
- 2) Informal gatherings for discussion with graduate students are held every year concerning topics ranging from the curriculum and research support system to academic and extra-curricular support in order to improve course management and education quality. Parties and gatherings are planned with consideration to any religious restrictions. Attention is also given to students' accompanying family in regards to everyday life, social life, and health, in close coordination with volunteers from the local community.
- 3) Most supervising professors hold periodical tea parties or lunch sessions to encourage interaction with Japanese students to build friendships and allow international students to expand their personal networks.
- 4) A short visit of about one week to local and central public administration offices is conducted yearly, based on the research needs of each student. This experience allows students to acquire a practical understanding of effective public administration and serves as a basis for comparative study of various aspects of public administration. Past years have included visits to Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare, Ministry of Foreign affairs, Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications, United Nations University Library, Statistical Institute for Asia and Pacific, National Tax College, National Diet Building and Embassy of Bangladesh in Japan.

12 . Features of Graduate School

The Public Administration Course at the Graduate School of Economics employs experienced professors in the field of policy development projects in various Asian developing countries as well as experts in East Asian studies. Specialized professors designated to work with Pacific-LEADS Fellows also provide practical guidance and supervision to meet fellows' specific needs. The course is specifically and carefully designed to be implemented systematically and consistently to develop the academic capabilities and experience of Pacific-LEADS Fellows. If a research proposal requires interdisciplinary guidance, multiple professors can be available for joint instruction

specific to the student's needs.

In developing countries, in the field of public administration, effective and practical implementation of policies is often hindered by ineffective administrative systems and other issues such as disorganization, corruption, defective law and order, or a failed judicial system. Efforts to deliver administrative services that meet community needs, and reforms in public servant systems and government organizations are conducted, however, due to lack of practical experience; countries face several difficulties. In addition, under conditions imposed by International Organizations, decentralization of the government is proceeding, requiring capacity building of local governments in the financial and administrative sections and social management at a local level including administration of ODA projects.

Our Graduate School has two professors in public administration related disciplines with experience providing their knowledge for several ODA projects for more than 20 years, including projects funded by the World Bank, Asian Development Bank, JBIC and JICA. Such experience is used to its full extent to guide Pacific-LEADS Fellows to find solutions to their specific issues.

Our Graduate School understands that human resource development in 1) management of public policy, 2) decentralization of public administration and 3) improvement of governance and anticorruption is crucial to build a stable nation, and aims to train students to be talented professionals who will be able to lead in their fields, exhibiting expertise in solving various problems from a broad range of perspectives related to public administration.

The public administration course is offered entirely in English, thus providing an environment in which to pursue academic research, supported by a strong, judicious supervisory program. In order to obtain the skills required for the creation of a master's thesis in the field of social science, an academic writing course is provided as a compulsory component of the program.

13 . Program Features and Curriculum

Compulsory courses such as Public Administration, Principles of Administrative Law, and Program Evaluation are offered in order to allow students to acquire the knowledge and ability for public administration, policy making and administrative evaluation. Compulsory courses such as Economics, Public Economics, Development Economics and Public Finance are offered in order to allow students to acquire the knowledge of economics needed for public administrators. A comprehensive range of elective courses is offered to allow students to learn basic and applied research in the field of public administration, economic analysis of development challenges, and analysis of and solutions for specific development issues.

Students are encouraged to pursue a deeper understanding of their research theme through regular thesis instruction. An instruction course is offered before coming to Japan so that students can have a smooth start to their research. Special programs are offered to improve students' abilities in mathematics and English. Other ad hoc programs such as discussion with relevant government officials invited from various government sectors are conducted depending on the needs of individual research proposals.

Visiting programs at central government bodies and other relevant Japanese public

institutions are also conducted to learn from practical experience in the field. Students
make interim thesis presentations in Bangladesh to improve the content of their
Master's study by inviting questions and comments related to their thesis from fellow
officials in ministries or institutions.

the stay, students can stay longer. When students start to live there, a deposit fee is required.

The room is classified into single, couple and family type equipped with refrigerator, washing machine, air-conditioning, bed and study desk.

The ISC selects the residents of the International Houses in January for the residents supposed to move in between April and September; in July for the residents supposed to move in between October and May next year. Every year, the number of the students who want to live in the International Houses exceeds that of the rooms we can supply. So ISC casts lots for the residents and considers the students' length of stay in Japan, their status of international students, etc..

Japanese Language Education Program for International Students

Japanese language courses are offered to international students on an optional basis. There are courses for beginner, intermediate and advanced students. International students can take any of the courses free of charge according to their Japanese ability. All of the courses are accepted as credits for undergraduates. Moreover, students who do not need credits but are still interested in the classes can audit courses with permission from the lecturer.

Events

Yamaguchi University aims to enrich your social opportunities with a range of year-round events. Organized by Yoshida's on-campus residents, the Tanabata-sai (Star Festival) is held in summer. In fall, the student-run University Festival takes place on each campus. The festival is called "Himeyama Festival" on Yoshida Campus, "Medical Festival" on Kogushi Campus, and "Tokiwa Festival" on Tokiwa Campus. Students can complement their academic activities by participating in the festivals providing them with a great opportunity to mingle with not only Japanese students but also with local residents. In addition, the university has invited alumni back to campus for Homecoming celebrations since 2012. Former international students are also welcome to attend this event.

Cultural Activities

Incoming International Student Orientation (April/October)

Yamaguchi University offers orientation for incoming international students twice a year. It covers topics such as the outline of Yamaguchi University, procedures at the Immigration Office, trash separation, anti-crime measures, and traffic rules. It also aims to enable international students to forge new friendships with each other through recreational activities, etc.

International Student Gathering (November)

We host the International Student Gathering on an annual basis to give international students encouragement and promote cross-cultural understanding. The gathering consists of two parts. In the first part, a panel discussion is conducted and international students make presentations on their countries/regions and experiences in Japan. The second part features a social gathering with the participation of over 300 people including international students, international researchers, Japanese students, local supporters of international students, faculty and staff at Yamaguchi University including President. Playing of traditional musical instruments, singing and dancing by international students always liven up the gathering.
