

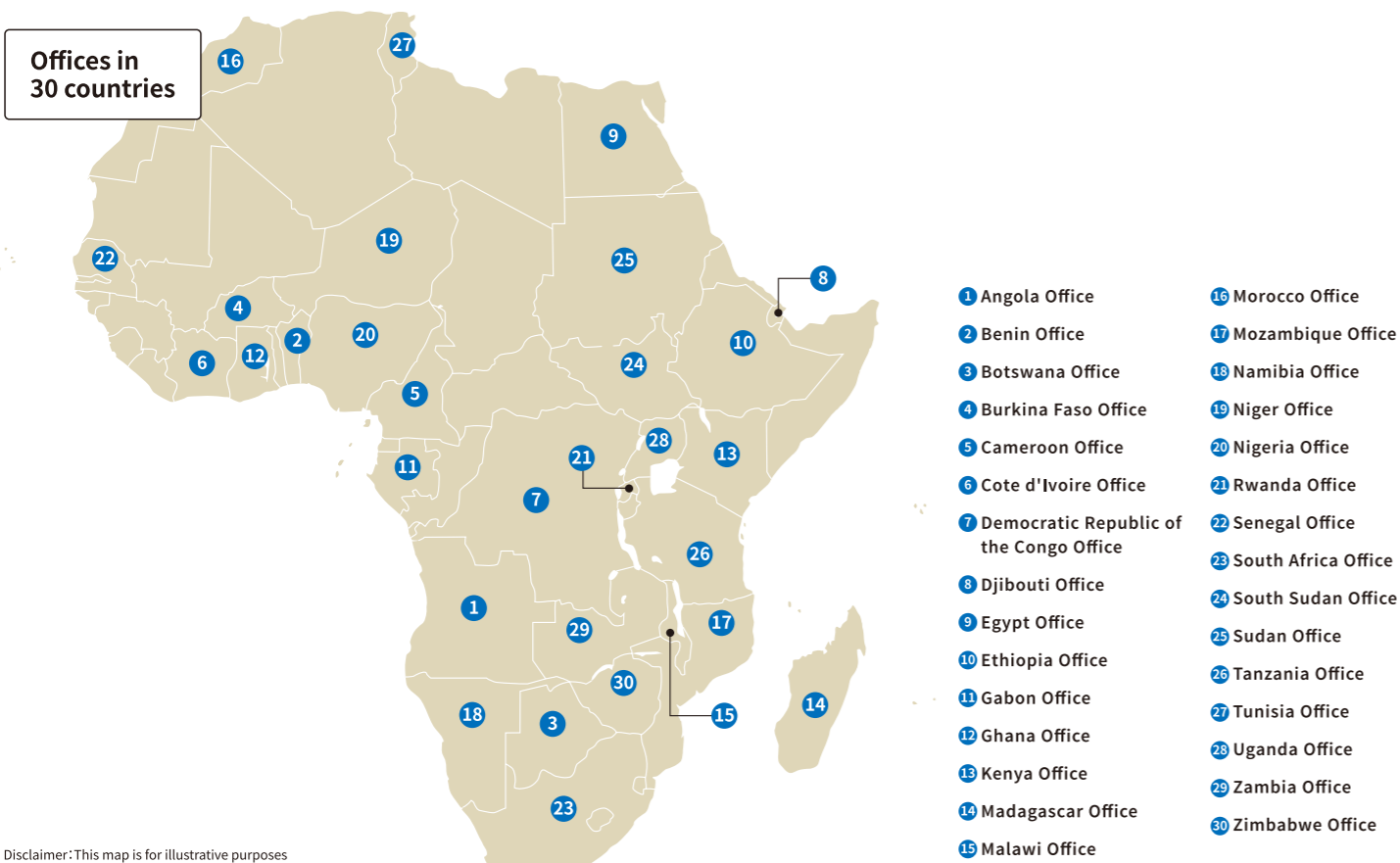
Our Contributions to SDGs

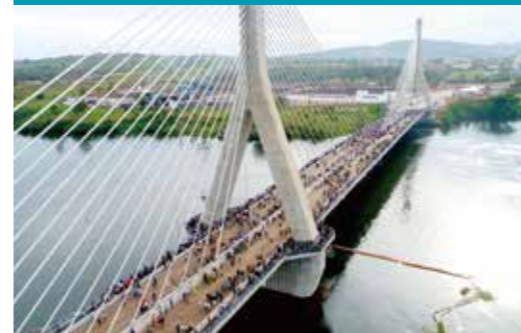

The Tokyo International Conference on African Development (TICAD) was held in Africa (Nairobi, Kenya) for the first time in August 2016. (All the previous conferences had taken place in Japan.) The Nairobi Declaration adopted in that memorable TICADVI emphasized that structural economic transformation through economic diversification and industrialization, resilient health systems for quality of life and social stability for shared prosperity were the key issues to tackle new challenges that Africa had been facing since TICADV in 2013.

For those challenges, the Government of Japan committed in TICAD VI to invest for the future of Africa by supporting quality infrastructure, building a resilient health system and consolidating peace and stability from 2016 to 2018.

Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) has been taking various actions and demonstrating steady results for the future of Africa, with a view to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

1 Quality Africa

Promoting structural economic transformation through economic diversification and industrialization

- Strengthen connectivity by promoting quality infrastructure investment
- Promote private sector activities through human resource development and productivity improvement

In response to the decline of global commodity prices after 2013, JICA facilitates economic structural transformation through economic diversification and industrialization in Africa. In particular, JICA advances the development of quality infrastructure by investing approximately USD 10 billion in Corridor development (which includes three geographical priority areas where the Japanese private sector shows high interest), natural resource and energy development, and urban development. JICA also promotes private sector activities through developing human resource development, and increasing productivity improvement, enhancing added value and financial assistance.

Human Resource Development for Business and Industry



JICA seeks to help develop human resources with practical skills for African industries that also meet the needs of Japanese companies. This includes training programs for mathematics and science teachers, support for vocational training and higher education and KAIZEN initiatives in manufacturing industry and business sectors. In addition, JICA also offers opportunities for young Africans to study at master's courses in Japan and experience internship in Japanese enterprises through its ABE Initiative (African Business Education Initiative for Youth), and follows up on those young Africans, after they return to their countries, with the objective of fostering human resources who can drive Japanese companies expanding business in Africa.

JICA disseminates KAIZEN Initiative throughout Africa with the New Partnership for Africa's Development (NEPAD) Planning and Coordinating Agency*, and improves quality and productivity by utilizing the expertise of Japanese companies.

*The NEPAD Planning and Coordinating Agency is a technical body of the African Union (AU) and is scheduled to be reorganized and renamed as the African Union Development Agency (AUDA) in 2019

TICAD VI (2016–2018)

Target: Promote KAIZEN Initiative throughout Africa to improve productivity by 30%

Progress: The Project on Capacity Building for Dissemination of KAIZEN implemented in Ethiopia from 2009 to 2014 demonstrated productivity per unit time increased by an average of 37.2%. Similar projects are ongoing in Egypt, Tunisia, Ghana, Cameroon, Kenya, Tanzania and Zambia. JICA thus launched the Africa KAIZEN Initiative in collaboration with the NEPAD Planning and Coordinating Agency in 2017 to disseminate Kaizen throughout Africa.

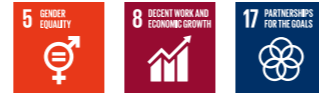

Improving Connectivity and Regional Economic Integration through Corridor Development



Accelerate trade expansion by promoting Corridor Development Approach, which comprehensively integrates industrial development, social sector development and economic infrastructure development along economic corridors. Encourage public-private partnership from master planning stage to project implementation stage.

Power Development



Develop renewable energy such as geothermal power generation. Support African Power Pool Initiatives (international and domestic power lines, development of distribution lines, etc.) and develop human resources for managing and maintaining electric power systems.

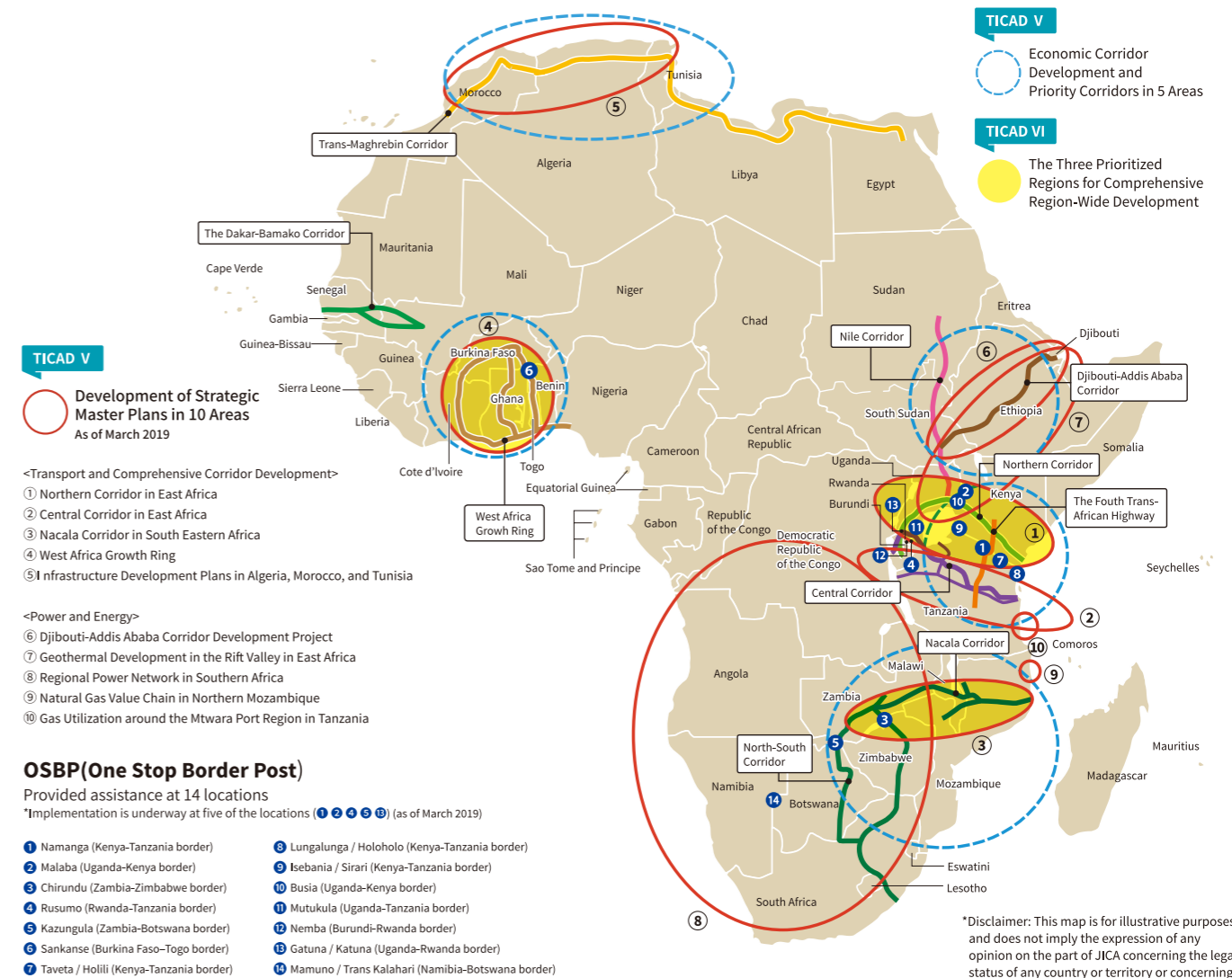

Promoting resilient health systems for quality of life

- Strengthen the capacity of responding, preventing, and preparing for public health crises
- Promote UHC in Africa

JICA focuses on building resilient health system for quality of life in order to respond pandemics including Ebola Virus Diseases. In Africa, JICA promotes the G7 Ise-Shima Vision for Global Health. While focusing on the ownership and leadership of each country, JICA also supports human resources for health to cope with infectious diseases, promotes universal health coverage (UHC), and accelerates the Initiative for Food and Nutrition Security in Africa (IFNA).

Promotion of Universal Health Coverage (UHC)



JICA promotes Universal Health Coverage (UHC), through financial and technical cooperation, by training health service workers and strengthening service delivery systems including health financing. JICA also promotes maternal and child health, reproductive health, and measures for infectious and non-infectious diseases to achieve UHC.

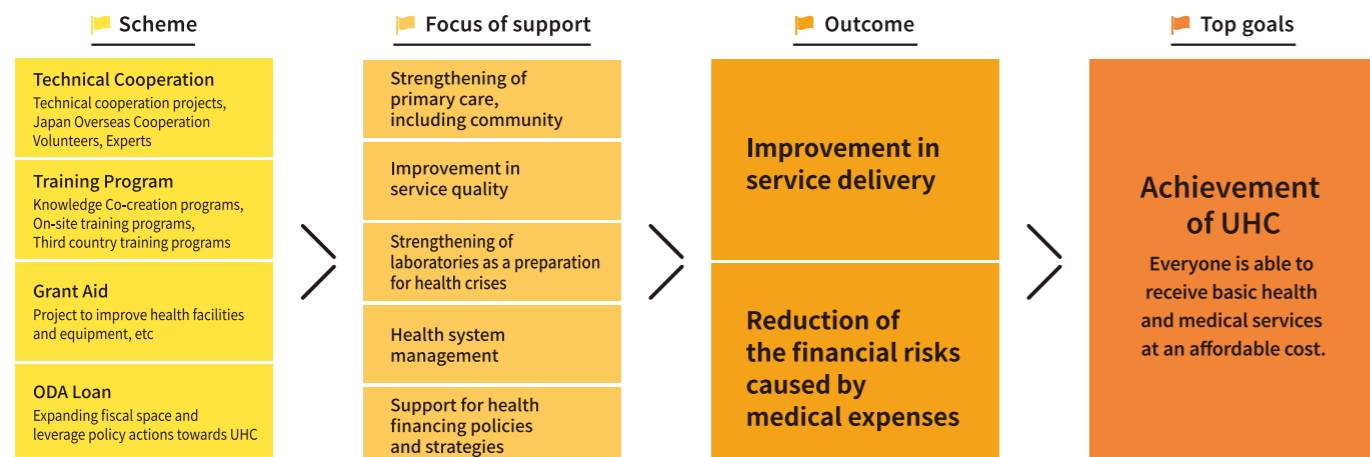

3 Stable Africa

Promoting social stability for shared prosperity

- Lay the foundations for peace and stability including education and vocational training for youths

JICA assists in building a solid foundation for social stabilization to address the global expansion of violent extremism, armed conflicts, and climate change. JICA's contributions include developing human resources such as vocational training, transferring techniques to farmers and extension workers to increase rice production, responding to climate change and natural disasters, and managing forest resources.

Doubling Rice Production in 10 Years



Facilitate the National Rice Development Strategy (NRDS) of each country under the Coalition for African Rice Development (CARD), founded in 2008. Also, promote the entire value chain, such as extension, production, post-harvest handling and marketing, through technical and financial cooperation and research activities in collaboration with other development partners.

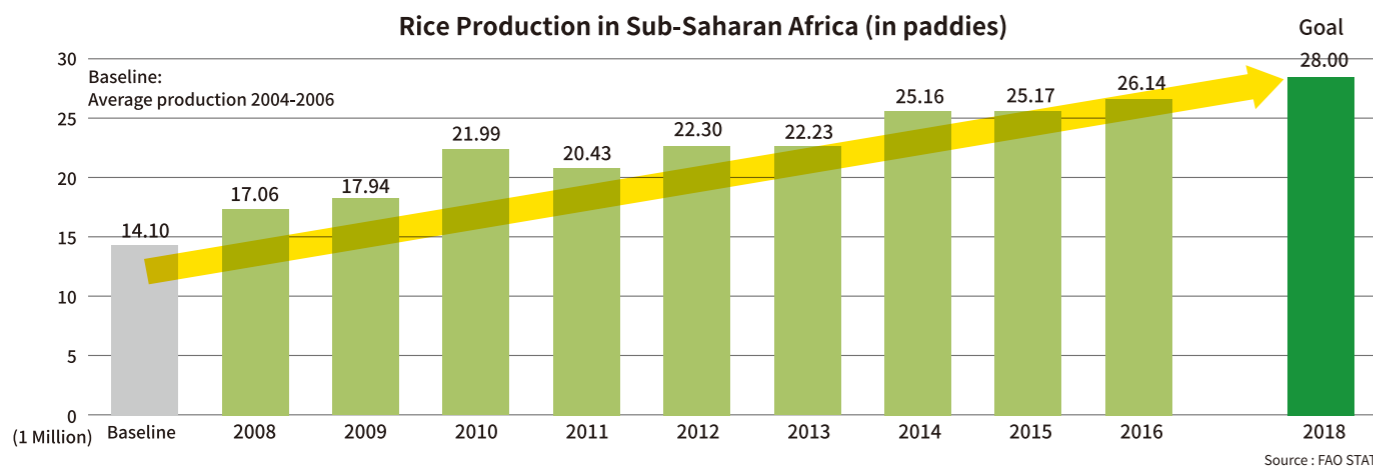

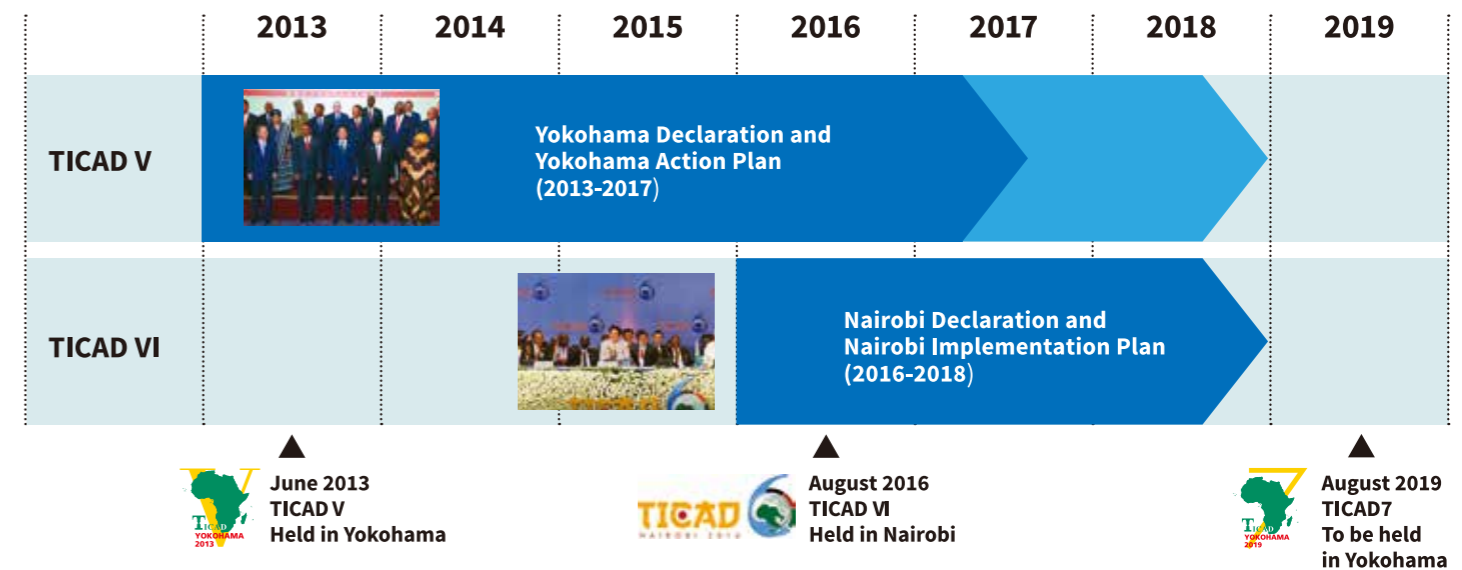

TICAD VI in Nairobi symbolically showed strong commitment and ownership of the African Countries for their own development.

The participating countries agreed to make a stride towards diversification and industrialization in the African economy by promoting investments in quality infrastructure and human resources. They also agreed to promote a resilient health system for all and to seek peace and stability.

JICA has been making efforts to steadily implement various activities, such as the African Business Education (ABE) initiative for youths, the KAIZEN initiative to improve productivity and

quality in the African enterprises and Universal Health Coverage (UHC) to enable all African people to receive quality but affordable health services.

TICAD7 will be held in Yokohama in August 2019. Reflecting the growing engagement of a broad base of stakeholders, it will serve as an open platform for action of inclusive economic growth in African countries, promotion of human security and establishment of peace and stability. JICA, as a longtime partner of trust with Africa, will thus continue to make efforts in collaboration with the private sector, development institutions and others.



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
