





The World Bank and Japan

- Japan joined the World Bank in August 1952
- 31 projects were implemented with World Bank loans for the development of the nation's economic foundation
- In 1966, Japan graduated from borrower status
- In 1984, Japan became the second-largest shareholder, and has been one of the most important partners.

FCV Landscape of the Current Europe


Ongoing War and National/Food/Energy Security




Ongoing Fighting in Ukraine

- Based on an online meeting between WB/JICA on the next day of the Russian invasion.
- JICA provided Yen 78 billion (approximately US\$600 million) loan as co-financing with World Bank to contribute to social and economic stabilization. WB provided US\$489 million and increased its commitment through PEACE projects.





Uprising of Youth and Women Collapse of Long Lasting Authoritarian Regimes








Emergence of ISIS and Continuous Repression of the Assad Regime

WB/JICA Partnership through the Global Concessional Financing Facility (GCFF)

Rationale: Middle income countries provide a global public good by hosting refugees, but struggle to access concessional finance to afford the costs.
