- worsening others




People are feeling insecure everywhere



More than 6 in 7 people worldwide perceived feeling moderately or very insecure just before the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic.








Unprecedented drops in human development, two years running




New and Old Layers of Uncertainty


Uncertainty and insecurity are driving divisions between groups in society and affecting our ability to cooperate and talk with each other.

People who **feel more insecure** also feel a lesser sense of control over their own lives.

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
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
