5S is the name of a workplace organization methodology that uses five Japanese words. These Japanese words have been converted in English to Sorting, Settingin-Order, Shining, Standardizing and Sustaining the Discipline.

"Shining" means to clean the workspace and all equipment, and keep it clean.




4. Standardize: Keep clean

"Sustaining" means to accustom everyone to follow set rules and procedures



> PDCA Cycle Management consists of

P: Plan: Set targets and objectives, and formulate the action plan.

D: Do: Carry out the plan

C: Check: Verification within execution. If didn't conduct as plan, should analysis the factors.

A: Action: Based on the verification results, consider what measures and improvements should be conducted.

JICA's Project Evaluations at a Glance

To improve its projects (learning) and ensure accountability to stakeholders, JICA evaluates each project and conducts comprehensive and cross-sectoral thematic analyses.

Project PDCA Cycle and Project Evaluation

JICA evaluates projects based on the four-stage PDCA cycle for project management, namely: pre-implementation (Plan), implementation (Do), post-implementation (Check) and feedback (Action).

Accountability

JICA ensures accountability via ex-post evaluation (refer to pp. 4-5).

Ex-post evaluation

JICA ascertains and evaluates especially whether the activities conducted through the project were appropriate for achieving the development effects and which effects were actually achieved by the project.

Feedback (Action)

JICA utilizes evaluation results to follow up on past projects as required and leverages this information as feedback to formulate similar future projects (by sharing evaluation results to improve future activities as required). At the feedback stage (Action), JICA shares feedback to improve projects (Learning) (refer to pp. 8-7).

Ex-ante evaluation



At the planning stage, JICA confirms the priority/necessity and expected effects of the project and sets indicators and targets to measure the effects both during and after project implementation. At the same time, JICA makes sure that lessons learned from past projects are properly reflected in the project.

JICA observes whether the project activity is progressing as planned and whether outcomes have been properly achieved as well as adjusting the trajectory as required.




- Definition of KAIZEN

- 3) Correspondence to realistic constraints


- Steps of KAIZEN
