These volunteers, stationed either at our headquarters office or on-site at specific NTF locations, contribute their expertise and support to our programs, enriching our efforts with diverse perspectives and skills.

Background

The National Trust of Fiji is a statutory body created in 1970 to provide for the protection of Fiji's natural, cultural and national heritage. The National Trust Act (Cap 265) of 1978, was later strengthened by the Fiji Government's National Heritage Policy in 1996 and the National Trust Amendment Act of 1998. The passing of the Fiji National Culture Policy in cabinet in 2023 strengthens the work of the NTF by providing a robust framework that aligns with and supports the safeguarding and promotion of Fiji's cultural and natural heritage.

National Trust has been successful in establishing and managing some 9 heritage sites throughout Fiji, together with a number of built assets, while linking and coordinating well with a range of stakeholders, from government organisations,

NGOs [regional/international], tourism organisations and industry to community groups.

A series of related activities, including preeradication assessment, eradication of invasives species, consultations on National Sustainable Tourism Framework 2023 - 2032, awareness, community education and capacity-building, are also undertaken on an ongoing basis.

The National Trust of Fiji manages the following 9 sites considered to be of cultural, natural, and national Heritage:

- Yadua Taba Wildlife Sanctuary (natural heritage)
- Sigatoka Sand Dunes National Park (cultural and natural heritage)
- Sovi Basin Protected Area (natural heritage)
- Garrick Memorial Forest Reserve (national heritage)
- Momi Battery Historic Park (national heritage)
- Borron House (national heritage)
- MH Building in Levuka (cultural heritage)
- Laucala Ring Ditch Fort (cultural heritage)
- Waisali Forest Reserve (national heritage)
