While the coronavirus pandemic is still affecting the world, there has been a resumption in JICA's volunteer programme. One of the overseas cooperation volunteers who went home to Japan in March 2020 returned in November 2022, and the general dispatch of volunteers has continued since then. While we continue to have online meetings with Jamaica's governmental agencies, in August 2022, we resumed face-to-face meetings with our main governmental partner, the Planning Institute of Jamaica (PIOJ). I feel that we are now able to see the range of new collaborations while continuing with the thorough implementation of coronavirus countermeasures.

In terms of development issues, by observing the movement to strengthen cooperation with agriculture, fisheries, manufacturing, etc. in the tourism industry and the "Grow Smart and Eat Smart" policy launched by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries, we can feel that the Jamaican government is aiming to build a resilient social infrastructure that is resistant to disasters, and JICA's response to such a strong commitment from Jamaica is an urgent issue.

The "Data Collection Survey on Development Cooperation With/Post COVID-19 Society in Central America and the Caribbean Region "which is being conducted by JICA for two phases until the end of FY2022 is the first of JICA 's response and both sides (Japan and Jamaica) have agreed on the formulation of the following new projects.

- Enhancement of Sharing experience/knowledge and partnership with Caribbean region countries on tourism crisis management (third-country training); and
- 2 International Training Course on the Community Police-KOBAN System (third country training).

In addition, we are earnestly working on the formation of new collaborative projects in the fields of Education, Fisheries and Regional Branding. We are looking to greatly rebuild for children, fishermen and small and medium-sized Enterprises who have been severely affected by the coronavirus pandemic.

I ask myself: In the nearly half a century since the development cooperation between Japan and Jamaica began, have we been able to build a Flagship project that we can be proud of?

We hope to progress to the launch of flagship projects, which will lead to a brighter future.

JICA Volunteers are Back

Re-assigned as a Japanese Language Instructor, Mikiko TAKEDA, marks the return of the JICA Volunteer Program in Jamaica. On Monday, November 28, 2022 Ms. Takeda officially resumed duties at the University of the West Indies, Mona, following a few days of re-orientation to the island. Ms. Takeda served for under three months before all Japan Overseas Cooperation Volunteers (JOCVs) in Jamaica returned to their home country at the start of the COVID-19 pandemic. She has extensive experience in international affairs both in her home country and overseas.

After Ms. Takeda's arrival, JICA continued to welcome incoming JOCVs to the island. At the end of January, 2023, two more volunteers were re-dispatched to continue their services to the island. They are Mrs. Yuko Aoki and Ms. Natsumi Nagamura.

Mrs. Aoki, a veteran musicologist with a special love for the piano, although an expert with other musical instruments. She is thrilled about the opportunity to return to Edna Manley College of the Performing and Visual Arts to impart knowledge to learners attending the college and youth at risk from peripheral communities.

Ms. Nagamura will once again serve the people of St. Ann at the St. Ann 4-H Club in Brown's Town. She is an avid environmentalist who shares her passion for a clean and healthy environment with everyone and anyone who cares to listen.

Volunteers are usually dispatched for two years in various fields from education, agriculture, occupational therapy, tourism and sports. Since 1989, the Japan International Cooperation Agency in Jamaica has been deploying volunteers to the island under its Japan Overseas Cooperation Volunteers (JOCVs) program. Prior to the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic in Jamaica in March 2020, four hundred and fifty (450) served in various sectors across the island. The program dispatches enthusiastic Japanese citizens who wish to participate in assisting developing countries while deepening mutual understanding and co-existence in cross-cultural societies.

JICA Chair's second symposium was held on Tuesday, February 21, at 10:00 a.m., jointly with the University of the West Indies (UWI) MONA Campus. There were approximately 100 participants in attendance including the UWI faculty members and students. Professor Kayo Takuma, Graduate School of Law and Political Science, Tokyo Metropolitan University was invited to speak on "Transformation of Global Health Governance and the Role Japan Plays". The discourse was timely considering the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Having been confined to a computer screen for two years, it was very stimulating and impactful meeting face-toface. After the lecture, a lively Q&A session ensued with participants.

As the UWI continues to develop human resources in the field of international politics and other disciplines, we hope that this will lead to the continued growth of JICA Chair and the development of international cooperation between Japanese universities and the University of the West Indies.



JICA's Knowledge Co-Creation Program

JICA's Knowledge Co-Creation Program (KCCP) is a development cooperation initiative with emphasis on a mutual learning process that suits partner countries, while respecting ownership, intentions and intrinsic characteristics of the country concerned. It has also maintained the approach of building reciprocal relationships with developing countries in which both sides learn from each other, grow, and develop together.

The key concept underpinning JICA's operations since its establishment in 1974 has been the conviction that "capacity development" is central to the socioeconomic development of any country. The courses under the Knowledge Co-Creation Program are usually conducted in Japan. Participants acquire useful knowledge and build on their existing expertise and that of their organization. Japan has an adoption and adaptation process with its own share of failures and errors behind numerous success stories. Jamaicans who mainly work with the government of Jamaica benefit from the training each fiscal year. Three courses were held in Japan for the first time since the outbreak of the COVID 19 pandemic. Six(6) other courses were held online.


