Data Collection Method

One important part of being a community development expert is to be able to collect data that will help you to formulate (design) a plan or project to help your host country local community. This will be difficult if you approach it from a direct line (i.e., I am the expert, and this is what I think is best for this community). A direct line will make you appear like more of an outsider than you already are and thus raise the risk that host country people will not cooperate with you.

Making a workshop is a great way to both collect useful data and to give the local community the feeling that it, not just you, have a good idea for how to solve a social problem it faces. The idea is to give the workshop participants as many opportunities as possible to offer ideas, formulate solutions, make original proposals and so on. A good workshop will make the participants feel that they are the main focus of the workshop and thus more likely to be motivated to implement the ideas generated.

To make a good workshop, you need to think about the following things:

1) What is the objective of the workshop?

You need to think about this and make it as clear as possible. If the objective is not clear, then the participants may not feel that it was worth their effort to attend. They may lose confidence in you. Try not to let that happen.

2) Who will be the participants (Invited stakeholders)?

It is important for you to identify stakeholders who will participate in the workshop. They will be the people you will work with in the future. They will have an understanding of the social issue you want to address. But be careful. A workshop with participants who strongly disagree with each other is inviting trouble. If there is such a gap within the community, then you should consider having separate workshops so that each group will feel comfortable expressing their true ideas/opinions.

- 3) Physical setting of the workshop
 - A) You need to think about where the workshop will take place. It should be in a safe and neutral place where all of the participants will feel comfortable in expressing their true ideas or opinions.
 - B) In that location, you will need to think about the setting for the workshop. In an ideal setting, there should be a comfortable place for people to sit in. There should be multiple boards for people to freely write their ideas or opinions on.
 - C) If you cannot find a suitable board, then I suggest that you use "Post-It" type sticky notes where users can write their ideas/opinions on one side and stick it to a wall/board/etc. for others to see.
- 4) Make a clear timeline

It is important to make time limits for activities because if they are not made, you will likely use far more time than you expect. You can guess how much time will be needed, but people tend to need more time than expected because they will have questions, have discussions, have disagreements and so on. Nonetheless, try to organize your workshop so that everyone will not feel uncomfortable meeting the limits and have enough time to completely say what they want to say. Setting the limits will be tricky but you will be better able to do it when you get more experience working with local people.

5) Methodology

You will need to make the objectives of the workshop as clear as possible so that the participants will have a clear idea of what is expected from them. If the objectives are not clear, the participants may move off topic with results that you cannot use.

A suggested methodology for a typical workshop is:

- A) Break down the participants into pairs or small groups. Give each set a time limit and a notepad to write their ideas on. They will organize their responses to match the objectives. Be sure to keep the time limit.
- B) Combine the different sets of participants into two different groups. Then have the groups tell and rank their responses to the objectives.
- C) Ask each group to explain its results. Then ask them to work together and rank the top responses as a comprehensive list. Be sure to emphasize that the result is a consensus of the participants.
- D) You should take notes of the results. You can use them as reasons/justifications/proof for a possible future JOCV project. They will also serve as a good reminder of what the community is really thinking at the time. The results are more likely to be accepted by the community when your project is implemented.

6) Your role as facilitator

You will be the facilitator of the workshop. That means it is your responsibility to stimulate the participants and to keep them active during the workshop. This is NOT a lecture so you should not just stand and talk to them. They did not come to listen to you. They came to contribute to helping improve their community. You should not be the center- they, the participants, should be.

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I realize that this is a lot of information to take-in, so I have prepared a sample workshop on the following page made by a former trainee, Yuko Ito. She did a great job and she used her first-hand experience of living in Africa to make the role play cards for the participants.

Role play cards are very important since your classmates will be the participants- the cards should contain the important information for each participant to follow so that the workshop will be as realistic as possible- of course, in your host country, you will not need to make such cards- the participants will be themselves.).

The role play cards are based on real lives but they DO NOT use the real names of real people. They are to enable the workshop to take place in an environment that will help JOCV volunteers be prepared.

		children. Despite these poor conditions, some women have joined each other and created WOFAK. It is a good example of how to empower women to build better lives together. What does to think positively mean? Can you do it even though you might have HIV?Let's continue.

10 Minutes	What is WOFAK?	According to the Executive Director of WOFAK, Ms who Is HIV positive, to live positively means to do our best to live well with HIV without being a danger to others or to ourselves. It also means there is hope and it's important to focus on the quality of life than the quantity of life. To live positively, with self-respect, self-discipline, good mental health, and patience is important. WOFAK will help women to acquire both mental strength and give economic support to them.
		WOFAK is an NGO founded in 1993 by a group of women who are HIV positive to support other women and children in the same Situation. Those women lost their husbands to AIDS, and they had to survive with their children against heavy social stigma. At that time, there were 13,000 clients.
		WOFAK is supported by and works with various international NGOs and government authorities such as the French Embassy, UNAIDS, the Global Fund, Barkley's Bank, UNICEF, Kenya Ministry of Health, People Bridge Charitable Foundation of Canada and many more.
		As you can see, the donors are quite powerful and that gives WOFAK a lot of hope for the future.
		Many WOFAK clients are HIV positive and Kenyans so they and you can understand each other's problems, be compassionate and protect each other's privacy. WOFAK also works with religious groups so members can have religious, ethical, and emotional help as well as medical and economic support. It aims to reduce the HIV/AIDS mortality rate in Kenya. Now, about 300 people die from it every day and even more are not reported.
12 minutes		Unfortunately, WOFAK does not have an office in Migori. The closest one is in Homa Bay, but we will work hard to have an office here in Migori. Saying that, there are still many other women self-help groups in Migori which we will talk about later.

	What WOFAK has to offer	WOFAK has a lot to offer. It offers care and support to women and children affected by HIV/AIDS. For example:

Used		- Vocational training for older OVCs and women. It can teach them about computing, masonry, carpentry, metal work, hair dressing, automobile repair and maintenance, business management, bookkeeping, knitting, finance and many more. - It gives education about topics such as fair trade, political rights, human rights, reproductive health, and HIV/AIDS prevention. - It provides nutritional support for bedridden clients and OVCs such as free lunch meals on weekdays. Nutrition advice is given by professional nutritionists. - WOFAK provides counseling and group counseling and therapy not only from counselors but also from doctors, nutritionists, government officials, religious leaders, and legal officers. This counseling is normally introduced after clients have been informed by VCTs about positive HIV test results. - WOFAK can give comprehensive medical care by doing the the following: A) Provide drugs for treatment of illnesses B) Provide ARVs C) Do tests such as liver function tests D) Monitor medical concerns such as CD4 counting, drug adherence, etc. This is important because drugs are expensive, and you will have to give bribes to get quick test results (It can take up to 6-months if you don't pay a bribe) - WOFAK provides support to OVCs of 1.5 to 2 million Kenyan schillings for lost loved ones, nutritional support, primary education, education for guardians and parents and so on. - WOFAK helps with HBC by providing nursing care, emotional Support, bathing for those who need it, etc. for families that can afford it. - WOFAK helps provide antenatal and postnatal care along with HIV tests for pregnant women to protect their babies. Do you have any questions about how WOFAK can help you? Let's continue. Now I want you to be the African woman written on your role-play cards. Please become the woman. Feel like her. Act like her. It is important to be that person and give that person's opinion and ideas. (I will give each participant a role-play card)

Role Play Card 1- Miriam (15 years old)

I am an orphan. Both of my parents are dead. I have nothing except for a few old clothes. My parents died when I was about 5 years old. I have done everything to survive. I sold water on the street, I broke stones and sold them, I polished shoes and I collected garbage and sold what I could from it. I am staying with my aunt-in-law, but she always beats me with a stick for no reason. I don't get the same kind or the same amount of food as her children even though I do all of their chores.

Some days I go without eating after doing all of the chores for my aunt-in-law without going to school. I am not allowed to talk to anybody or to make any friends. If I did, my aunt-in-law will beat me and lock me in the toilet all night.

People feel sorry for me. A neighbor introduced me to Mama Tima one day and now I am working for her because she needs somebody to do some house chores and she is busy sending five children to school every day. I don't feel the work is bad because at least I don't go to bed hungry at night after finishing work for her.

Mama Tima is very nice. She gives me food, a place to sleep at night and she treats me like a real child. I love Mama Tima even though we are not related at all.

One thing is I am HIV positive, and Mama Tima doesn't know about it. She might find out soon because recently I can't see very well. I know it is because of HIV because my HIV positive friend also lost her eyesight because of HIV. If Mama Tima takes me to hospital, she will find out about my condition sooner or later.

Should I tell her? She is already suffering too much about her ill sister. She might tell me to leave if she found out that I am HIV positive.

I don't have any other place to go. What can I do?

Role Play Card 2- Mama Kibibi

I am 22 years old. I live with my husband and 1-year old baby. I used to work in a hospital where I met my husband. He is a pharmacist. We enjoy our life together. I am lucky because most married couples are living separately in Kenya due to the husband's workplace is often different from where they live. Also, it is a Kenyan tradition to live together for the first two years of marriage.

But I am worried about my baby's future. My husband brings home a little money, but it is never enough. We manage to eat, but we don't have any savings. Kimbi is my first baby and I want to make sure she will have everything she needs for her life.

I have been told that I am HIV positive. So is my husband. Fortunately, Kimby is not. But I know we will not see her grow up to become an adult. We don't know when we are going to die, but I want to do everything for Kimbi while we are alive.

I asked my husband if I can go back to work, but he said, "No." because he is very jealous if I go out. He prefers me to stay at home and do house chores. He is a very traditional man, and he wants his wife to be somebody who is always there for him all the time.

A lot of times he comes home and checks if I am home. I know he loves me too much and I also love him from the bottom of my heart. Every day I fetch water, make tea, feed our baby, cook, go, and buy food, clean the house, do the laundry, and talk with other women in the neighborhood.

Thinking about Kimbi's future without her father or me is killing me. How can I convince my husband to let me do more?

Role Play Card 3- Mama Bakari- 32 years old

Just recently, my husband left me and our five children for another younger woman. He was the first and only man that I have ever known in my life, and he also said the same thing to me, but I think he lied.

I am HIV positive. I am unemployed. I have never done any work apart from house chores. I never went to school because I was selling grilled goat meat after my parents died when I was 10 years old to feed my little brother. He died 5 years ago.

I currently stay with my husband's mother (mother-in-law) who has already lost her husband from AIDS. She is also infected.

My mother-in-law doesn't know about my HIV status because if she knew, she would find out that her son is also infected. She is so nice to me, and I can't do that to her.

Her health is declining badly in the last few months. I think she need to be in hospital, but we can hardly afford to live. Now she is at home coughing badly. She has lost about 15 kilograms. She hardly moves and she sometimes looks like she just passed away.

I want to help her because she is like my mother. I want to take care of her. I have to get some money for us to eat. I have 5 children waiting for food to eat every day. Yesterday, we didn't have anything to eat. Things are very bad. What can I do?

Role Play Card 4- Zainab- 21 years old

I am from the Congo, but due to the long fighting and conflicts there, I am now in Kenya. I have lost all of my family except for my mother who sent me to Migori to be a commercial sex worker. I don't have a home and I don't know where my mother is. I just have to send money to her from my cell phone. I miss her so much. Why doesn't she want to see me?

I stay in a small room in a cheap accommodation with three other girls where truck drivers come and sleep while waiting till their customs documents are ready. I sleep until 6 PM and start drinking in the hotel with those drivers, they have a lot of money, and they always tell interesting stories. They also take me to nice night clubs. I usually have sex with them and get paid about 100 to 500 schillings. Sometimes I don't get paid for sex- I just get food and drink.

I am HIV positive. I found out a month ago. I don't really care because my mother doesn't care about me. Men don't want to wear a condom with me but that fine because I won't die alone.

I feel so lonely. One day, I want to see my mother with a healthy and clean body. I also want to get married to somebody who loves me. I don't want to have sex with men for money anymore.

I feel it is better to die. But I have no other way to make money. I have no education. I cannot read or write. I don't know anything about business. What can I do?

Task 3- Make a workshop plan

Purpose:

You will have a very limited amount of time to not only improve your English language skills, but also learn and use appropriate vocabulary and skills. As you could see from the above sample workshop plan and role cards, having a workshop is one effective way for you to gather information related to your future plans and to practice your English. How To Evaluate a Formal Written Proposal

We have spent a lot of time covering how to prepare for and have a successful workshop. We have not spent any time studying how you can judge if a formal written proposal is good or bad, useful or not useful and so on.

- "JICA Guidelines for Project Evaluation" sets five evaluation criteria for JOCV host country technical projects. The criteria are:
- 1) Relevance- The relevancy of the project is judged to the needs of the beneficiaries and whether the project's objective is consistent with the policies of the host country and Japan is also considered.
- 2) Effectiveness- The project's ability to achieve its objectives of bringing benefits to the stakeholders is considered.
- 3) Efficiency- Assessment of whether the resources used for achieving the objective are used effectively.
- 4) Impact- Long-term impacts and related effects caused by the project are assessed.
- 5) Sustainability- The ability of the project to still be in place in a sustainable manner is assessed.

I work for the Japan Oversea Cooperation Volunteer as a community development expert. My job is to help the homeless street children who live in Accra. Ghana. As you know, they are so poor, and they need food and a safe and clean place to sleep at night.

I would like to ask IICA to help me help the children. I have an idea. I want \$5,000 U.S. dollars so that I can buy food and clothes for them. I will give them food twice a day and will give them tents so that they can sleep safety at night. It is so dangerous in Accra at night.

I will write a report to you every month telling you how many kids I have saved. I think it will be many because 5,000 U.S. dollars will buy much food and many tents. I also plan to put pictures of this great project on the Internet to show how great IICA is to help the children.
