The Eighth Tokyo International Conference on African Development (TICAD8) held in Tunisisa on August 27 and 28, 2022 and with representatives from over 40 African countries participating, was a resounding success. At the conference, H.E. Mr. Fumio KISHIDA, Prime Minister of Japan, stated that Japan will as a "partner growing together with Africa" contribute to African Development through Japan's distinctive approach that focuses on "people." Japan will invest US\$30 billion as the sum of public and private financial contribution over the next three years to rapidly advance Japan-Africa relations and with an emphasis on "investment in people" and "quality of growth."

JICA for enhanced health facilities, employee satisfaction and patient satisfaction



Dr. Mthandazo Mabanga and Ms. Monica Chirinzepi from Gwanda Hospital and Sally Mugabe Hospital respectively attended the KCCP online course on Quality Improvement of Health Services through KAIZEN Approach, from August 29 to September 3. Under this course and through practical case studies, they learnt how to apply the 5S-KAIZEN-TQM approach, problem identification and analysis, and ways to continuously improve hospital management, quality management and healthcare services in the face of the different constraints they encounter.



'Maintaining what is obtained'

JICA has over the past two decades promoted agricultural and infrastructural development through projects like the Nyakomba Irrigation Development and ZIM-SHEP. In support of such developments and through the KCCP online course "Maintenance, Operation and Management of Irrigation Facilities," JICA is training and strengthening the capacity of administrative and technical officials involved in agricultural and irrigation projects to:

- Appropriately maintain, operate and manage irrigation facilities.
- ♦ Make effective use of limited resources in a sustainable manner.
- ♦ Improve planning and implementation of legal systems, operation management systems and technology transfer to farmers for enhanced agricultural productivity.

Mr. Christopher Mhlope from the Department of Irrigation, along with participants from Belize, Egypt, Iran, Mozambique and Nepal attended the online course which ran from August 29 to September 28. Having completed the course, the participants will produce reports on how they will apply the knowledge and ideas acquired and discussed in the program to their on-going activities.

Learning by practice in Japan

Agnes Dube participated in the JICA KCCP short "Nutrition Improvement Agriculture" in Japan and Madagascar from July 2-22 2017. Upon returning to Zimbabwe, she implemented the "work with what communities have" approach, and realised that communities were faced with drought, climate change and soils that did not allow for optimal production. Following the short course and application of what she learnt, a hunger was birthed in her on how nutrition can be improved in the face of realities. Thus, she went back to Japan for a Masters' program (Oct 2020 - Sep 2022) at Tottori University, an opportunity afforded to her through JICA's AgriNet scholarship. There, she learnt ways to improve crop productivity for people who produce under semi-arid to arid conditions.

10 years post training in Japan



In 2012, Bevean Moyo, a Lecturer by profession, was privileged to attend a JICA KCCP course, "Improving Teaching Methods in Science and Mathematics in Primary Education" in Japan. He sums the past 10 years with the words, 'exciting growth and remarkable innovation' as he managed to apply and to share the knowledge, experiences and skills he learnt in Japan. In 2012 (Sep to Dec) and 2013 (Jan and Feb) he participated in primary school workshops in Beitbridge and in 2013 he was promoted to lectureship at the Joshua M. Nkomo Polytechnic. At the polytechnic, not only has he managed to produce electronic teaching gadgets but he has managed to assist many students to innovate electronic gadgets that have been exhibited and in some cases won awards at platforms like the Zimbabwe International Trade Fair (ZITF) and the Africa Expo.

deployment of Japan Overseas Cooperation Volunteers (JOCVs) has seen students benefit immensely, according to Bulawayo Polytechnic School of Hospitality and Tourism, Head of Department Mr. Cephas Chikwira. He described JICA volunteers as being disciplined committed to their work.

The Bulawayo Polytech has received four tourism and hospitality volunteers since the introduction of the program in Zimbabwe in 1989. Currently the Polytech is hosting Mr. Daiki Shigetani who has developed a guest satisfaction survey for the School of Hospitality and Tourism's Hotel, St Patrick's. This has led to improvements in student studies and running of the hotel, which is an incubation hub for student development. Moreover, he has imparted the Japanese way of life as well as expertise in culinary arts and international hotel management trends. The JOCV program is also beneficial to the volunteers as they get to adopt to Zimbabwean culture and traditions, thereby effecting cultural exchange.

JICA's SHEP project results in increased farmers' yield and in turn improved farmers' livelihoods

Project for Zimbabwe Smallholder Horticulture Empowerment and Promotion (ZIM-SHEP) has been effective in raising smallholder farmer incomes from horticulture production. The SHEP approach changes farmer's mindset from "Grow and Sell" to "Grow to Sell" through conducting market surveys farmers themselves, establishing business linkages between farmers and service providers, and promoting genderequity.

The project has already benefited 12 districts in 4 provinces, over 2000 farmers in 13 irrigation schemes and over 30 Extension Officers at Provincial and District levels and is now in its 3rd batch in Mashonaland West and Masvingo Provinces. Site selection was done in May and the ZIM-SHEP team went on to rollout sensitization workshops in June and Gender mainstreaming training in July.

The Gender mainstreaming training encompassed a Training of Trainers (TOT), and in addition the ZIM-SHEP team backstopped frontline extension staff as they trained the targeted farmers. The gender mainstreaming training focused on strategies farming households may use to effectively allocate and utilize limited resources and time in order to increase their income, as well as imparting the importance of working together as a unit, making joint decisions and practising self-reliant farming.

As a result, the training contributed to shifting farmer mind-sets from the general assumption that the gender training was advocating for equal rights, to an understating of the importance of reviewing traditional gender roles. For instance, by allocating more time on productive roles and reducing the burden on reproductive roles, thereby leading to improved livelihoods.

The farmers understood that as couples, they should:

- have a shared goal of increasing income,
- work together to achieve the shared goal,
- plan the household budget together,
- share roles both in the agricultural field and in the household,
- have equal opportunities in management of the farming business and
- find solutions to improve farm productivity and profitability.

The farmers appreciated the eye-opening training and promised to continue with the exercises at a household level.



Committee Meeting for the "Project for Capacity Development for Smooth Operation of OSBPs on the North South Transport Corridor" was held in Zambia. Participants included members of the Zimbabwe Revenue Authority, the Zambia Revenue Authority, the JICA OSBP Team, and JICA Zimbabwe Representatives. The Overall Goal of this project is to enhance trade on the North-South Corridor through the facilitation of targeted OSBPs, with beneficiary countries including Botswana, South Africa, Zambia, and Zimbabwe.
