JICA setting the stage for Rice Production

On his trip to Zimbabwe to investigate rice production, Dr. Tatsushi Tsuboi paid a courtesy call to the First Lady, Dr. Auxillia Mnangagwa to discuss his plans during the visit. This was following the visit made by the First Lady to Japan in November last year, where she met with Dr. Tsuboi and discussed on how Zimbabwe can tap into rice production. He also travelled around the country visiting trial farms, research centres and seed companies, to determine the NERICA seed in the country and the suitability of the seed variety to the area under production.

Following this, he conducted a 2-day workshop which provided training for stakeholders on all things NERICA. His visit culminated in a training for researchers and students on research methods, as well as a wrap up meeting with the Permanent Secretary for Ministry of Lands, Agriculture, Fisheries, Water and Rural Development, Dr. John Basera, where he shared his findings and the way forward.

Dr. Tsuboi's trip was a resounding success with consensus that:

• Rice as a strategic crop can contribute to enhanced food security and nutrition in the country.

• There is great potential for commercialisation and increase of rice cultivation and productivity, not only to ensure self-sufficiency at household level, but to ensure the reduction of the rice import bill in the country.

JICA held the first JCC meeting for the 5S Project

January 16, JICA held the first Joint Coordinating Committee (JCC) meeting for the Project for Quality Improvement of Health Services through 5S-KAIZEN-TQM Approach, a project that JICA is rolling out in collaboration with the Ministry of Health and Child Care (MoHCC) from May 2022 to May 2026. In attendance were a Mission from JICA HQ, JICA Experts and officials from JICA, Embassy of Japan and MoHCC. At the meeting, the JICA Zim Resident Representative gave his assurance that the cooperation between JICA (Japan), MoHCC (Zimbabwe) would be maintained, and JICA would always be there to support the project. This was following remarks made by the Acting Permanent Secretary for MoHCC, Dr. Munyaradzi Dobbie who said that he is very grateful with the project as it will see many indicators improving, including reduction of patient waiting time, improvement of healthcare workers' attitude and morale and improving the availability of medicines and medical consumables. In support of the project, he pledged that, "As a country, we will give it our all."



Signing of the Minutes of Meeting To close off the meeting, the two parties JICA (JICA Mission) and MoHCC (QAPS Directorate) signed the Minutes of Meeting.

Fourth JCC Meeting for ZIM-SHEP Successfully Held

March 2, the 4th Joint Coordinating Committee (JCC) Meeting for the Project for Zimbabwe Smallholder Empowerment and Promotion (ZIM-SHEP) was held. The ZIM-SHEP project, which to date has had profound results is being rolled out by JICA in collaboration with the Ministry of Lands, Agriculture, Fisheries, Water and Rural Development (MLAFWRD), from March 2019 to February 2025. In attendance were a Mission from JICA HQ, JICA Experts and officials from JICA, Embassy of Japan and the MLAFWRD. Speaking on behalf of the MLAFWRD Permanent Secretary, the Director of Strategic Planning and Monitoring and Evaluation, Mr. Abraham Mashumba highlighted that the ZIM-SHEP project was a vehicle to grow the agriculture

sector by transforming smallholder farmers into income earners. He called on JICA and the MLAFWRD to learn from the project evaluation thus far on ways to improve, so that the SHEP approach can go beyond the irrigation schemes where it is currently being implemented and to upscale the 'farming as a business' model to a national model. JICA Zimbabwe Resident Representative, Mr. Kyosuke Kawazumi extended his gratitude to the MLAFWRD staff for their tireless commitment and support to ensuring the success of the ZIM-SHEP project. He pledged JICA's continued support towards the project in order to achieve the project's goal and to boost the economy of Zimbabwe.

February 1, JICA in partnership with the Ministry of Environment, Climate, Tourism and Hospitality Industry (MECTHI), the Zimbabwe Tourism Authority (ZTA) and the four Community Based Tourism (CBT) Enterprises Project Pilot Sites held a successful final seminar to share experiences, successes, challenges, lessons and recommendations that emerged during the implementation of the CBT Project. The project had run successfully from 2015 to January 2023 with the development of the Community Based Tourism Master Plan and implementation at four pilot sites namely Gairezi, Bulawayo, Tengenenge and Chesvingo. The Ambassador of Japan to Zimbabwe, His Excellency Mr. Satoshi Tanaka, commended the CBT for its multiple benefits, as it allows tourists to experience another side of Zimbabwe that is much richer and deeper than simply seeing a tourist site. He added that tourists get a chance to interact with members of the community, experience their fascinating art and culture, and learn their rich history, while at the same time appreciating the beautiful natural surroundings.

MECTHI's Permanent Secretary, Ambassador Raphael Tayerera Faranisi pointed out that his Ministry was grateful for the support they had received from the Japanese government through JICA in the development of the CBTs. He said there was no doubt the development of the CBTs will play a significant role in alleviating poverty and enhancing community development.

The beneficiaries of the project expressed gratitude that the CBT project had enabled them to acquire skills that will help them to manage and sustain their CBT sites. As a result, they look forward to developing new tourist products and attracting more tourists.
